














SURVEY OF 700 LIKELY VOTERS IN THE STATE OF FLORIDA

Survey Conducted November 30 – December 4, 2011


While party identification is split evenly within the state, a plurality of voters identify themselves as conservative in ideology.


Regardless of political registration, or support for Tea Party candidates, Floridians are overwhelmingly negative about the way Congress has been handling its job.














Voters are split on how well BP and the federal government handled the Gulf oil spill, despite the overall negative view of Congress and BP.


How would you rate the way <u>BP</u> has handled clean up and recovery from last year's Deepwater Horizon oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico?

Floridians universally believe the quality of their beaches and coastal waters are important to the state's economy. Voters of every party, as well as Tea Party supporters, think alike on this issue.





There is broad support across all political parties for candidates who are dedicated to getting the money BP is paying in fines to the affected coastal areas. This is a winning issue for candidates at any level.




